Curriculum Framework (According to NEP adopted by Himachal Pradesh University) for I year Students in 2026-27

Main features of the New Curriculum Framework

- i. Flexibility to move from one discipline of study to another;
- ii. Opportunity for learners to choose the courses of their interest in all disciplines;
- iii. Facilitating multiple entry and exit options with UG certificate / UG diploma / ordegree depending upon the number of credits secured;
- iv. Flexibility for learners to move from one institution to another to enable them to have multi and/or interdisciplinary learning;
- v. Flexibility to switch to alternative modes of learning (offline, ODL, and Online learning, and hybrid modes of learning).

Regulations for Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) and guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit are already in place to facilitate the implementation of the proposed “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes”.

Definitions, Eligibility, & Duration of Programme

Semester/Credits:

- A semester comprises 90 working days and an academic year is divided into two semesters.
- A summer term is for eight weeks during summer vacation. Internship / apprenticeship / work-based vocational education and training can be carried out during the summer term, especially by students who wish to exit after two semesters or four semesters of study. Regular courses may also be offered

during the summer on a fast-track mode to enable students to do additional courses or complete backlogs in coursework. The HEIs can decide on the courses to be offered in the summer term depending on the availability of faculty and the number of students.

COMPONENTS OF THE STRUCTURE / CURRICULUM FRAMEWORK OF UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

In the inaugural year of the undergraduate program, students will have the opportunity to create a multidisciplinary academic plan. This will include the following elements:

Course Type	Description
Major Core	The Central area of study chosen by the student and degree will be awarded in that discipline. Student has to acquire 60 credits for 3 year and 80 credits for 4 year program
Minor Stream	An additional area of study selected by the student, typically outside their major discipline. Minimum 12 Credits have to be earned from minor discipline. Student has to acquire 24 credits for 3 year and 32 for 4 year program.
Multidisciplinary	Course intended to broaden the intellectual experience and from part of liberal art and science education other than their major and minor stream. Student has to acquire 9 credits for 3/4 year program
Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)	Courses in English and Modern Indian Language aimed at enhancing language and communication skills. Student has to acquire 8 credits for 3/4 year program.
Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)	Practical courses designed to enhance the application of knowledge and provide hands-on experience. Student has to acquire 9 credits for 3/4 year program.
Value Added Courses	Extra course that provide additional knowledge and skills beyond the curriculum. Student has to acquire 6 credits for 3/4 year program.

After Year 4 (Hons with Research)	168 Credits	Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wish to undertake research at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year. They should do a research project or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty member of the University/College. The research project/dissertation will be in the major discipline. The students who secure 168 credits, including 12 credits from a research project/dissertation, are awarded UG Degree (Honours with Research).	4 Year UG Degree with Hons	

UG Degree Programmes with Single Major: A student has to secure a minimum of 50% credits from the major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a single major. For example, in a 3-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be earned is 128, a student of Physics with a minimum of 64 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. in Physics with a single major. Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be earned is 168, a student of Physics with a minimum of 84 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. (Hons./Hon. With Research) in Physics in a 4-year UG programme with single major.

Interdisciplinary UG Programmes: The credits for core courses shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines/subjects so as to get core competence in the interdisciplinary programme. For example, a degree in Econometrics requires courses in economics, statistics, and mathematics. The total credits to core courses shall be distributed so that the student gets full competence in Econometrics upon completion of the programme. The degree for such students will be awarded as B.Sc. in Econometrics for a 3-year UG programme or B.Sc. (Honours) / B.Sc. (Honours with Research) in Econometrics for a 4-year UG programme.

Multidisciplinary UG Programmes : In the case of students pursuing a multidisciplinary programme of study, the credits to core courses will be distributed among the broad disciplines such as Life sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, Humanities, etc., For example, a student who opts for a UG program in Life sciences will have the total credits to core courses distributed across Botany, Zoology and Human biology disciplines. The degree will be awarded as B.Sc. in Life Sciences for a 3-year programme and B.Sc. (Honours) in Life Sciences or B.Sc. (Honours with Research) for a 4-year programme without or

with a research component respectively.

The statutory bodies of the Universities and Colleges such as the Board of Studies and Academic Council will decide on the list of courses under major category and credit distribution for double major, interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary programmes.

Credit hours for different types of courses

The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. A credit is a unit by which the coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum 15 weeks).

Each course may have only a lecture component or a lecture and tutorial component or a lecture and practicum component or a lecture, tutorial, and practicum component, or only practicum component. For example, a three-credit lecture course in a semester means three one-hour lectures per week with each one-hour lecture counted as one credit. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a three-credit lecture course is equivalent to 45 hours of teaching.

One credit for tutorial work means one hour of engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a one-credit tutorial in a course is equivalent to 15 hours of engagement.

A one-credit course in practicum or lab work, community engagement and services, and fieldwork in a semester mean two-hour engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a one-credit practicum in a course is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A one-credit of Seminar or Internship or Studio activities or Field practice/projects or Community engagement and service means two-hour engagements per week. Accordingly, in a semester of 15 weeks duration, one credit in these courses is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits. For example, a 4-credit course with three credits assigned for lectures and one credit for practicum shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 2-hour duration field-based learning/project or lab work, or workshop activities per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a 4-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 30 hours of practicum. Similarly, a 4-credit course with 3-credits assigned for lectures and one credit for tutorial shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a four-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 15 hours of tutorials.

The following types of courses/activities constitute the programmes of study. Each of them will require a specific number of hours of teaching/guidance and laboratory/studio/workshop activities, field-based learning/projects, internships, and community engagement and service

- **Lecture courses:** Courses involving lectures relating to a field or discipline by an expert or qualified personnel in a field of learning, work / vocation, or professional practice.
- **Tutorial courses:** Courses involving problem-solving and discussions relating to a field or discipline under the guidance of qualified personnel in a field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.
- **Practicum or Laboratory work:** A course requiring students to participate in a project or practical or lab activity that applies previously learned/studied principles/theory related to the chosen field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice under the supervision of an expert or qualified individual in the field of learning, work/vocation or professional practice.
- **Seminar:** A course requiring students to participate in structured discussion/conversation or debate focused on assigned tasks/readings, current or historical events, or shared experiences guided or led by an expert or qualified personnel in a field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.
- **Internship:** A course requiring students to participate in a professional activity or work experience, or cooperative education activity with an entity external to the education institution, normally under the supervision of an expert of the given external entity. A key aspect of the internship is induction into actual work situations. Internships involve working with local industry, government or private organizations, business organizations, artists, crafts persons, and similar entities to provide opportunities for students to actively engage in on-site experiential learning.

Eligibility for the UG Programmes

Senior Secondary School Leaving Certificate or Higher Secondary (12th Grade) Certificate obtained after successful completion of Grade 12 or equivalent stage of education corresponding to Level-4.

Duration of the Programme

- i. The duration of the UG programme is 4 years or 8 semesters. Students who desire to undergo a 3-year UG Programme will be allowed to exit after completion of the 3rd year. If a student wants to leave after the completion of the first or second year, the student will be given a UG Certificate or UG Diploma, respectively, provided they secure the prescribed number of credits (as given in table 3). Students who exit with a UG certificate or UG diploma are permitted to re-enter within three years and complete the degree programme.
- ii. Students may be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study but the total duration for completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

Note:

- i. Only the minimum total number of credits in each semester is indicated above. The HEIs may decide the number of credits for each course (e.g. Major, Minor, Multidisciplinary, etc.) to fulfill the minimum number of credit requirements.
- ii. Students may be permitted to audit course(s) of their choice offered by the HEI provided they meet the pre-requisite for the course.
- iii. Minor stream courses can be from the 3rd 300 or above level and 50% of the total credits from minors must be secured in the relevant subject/discipline and another 50% of the total credits from a minor can be earned from any discipline as per students' choice.
- iv. Students are not allowed to take the same courses studied in the 12th class under the interdisciplinary category.
- v. 40% of the credits in any category may be earned through online courses approved by the Department and Institution as per the existing UGC regulations.
- vi. VIII-Semester core major may be seminar-based with students' presentations and discussions.
- vii. Students may be encouraged to enroll in activities such as NSS / NCC.

1. The DSC and minor of the first two semesters can be interchanged at the beginning of the Third semester against unfilled / vacant seats. Such choices made in third semester shall continue till the VI Semester.
2. The DSCs of 1st and 2nd semester of those students who opt to Major in the third semester other than Major's DSCs will be treated as Minors.
3. The minor subjects shall be chosen from the DSCs offered by the same faculty / stream but also be different from the Core / Major's subjects / disciplines.
4. MDCs must be selected from broad disciplines other than Major and Minor subjects.
5. SEC/AEC/VAC may be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline may provide these courses, some of which may be offered discipline specific while the rest can be open to students of all other discipline.
6. AECs should be of a language other than studied in DSCs / Minors.

7. To pursue 4 – year Honours degree student shall study one discipline in which he has atleast 10 core courses (6 DSC + 4 DSE) in the first three years.
8. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfillment of the following conditions : Major = 60/80 credits (3/4 yrs) and Minor = 28 credits (4 yr) in one subject / discipline.

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS) for II and III year Students

Government Degree College Nalagarh follows the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) of UGC which has been approved by Executive Council of Himachal Pradesh University.

The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed courses comprising Core, Elective and Skill-based courses. The course can be evaluated following the Grading System, which is considered to be better than the conventional marking system. Therefore, it is necessary to introduce a uniform grading system in the entire higher education in India. This will benefit the students to move across institutions both within India and across countries. The uniform grading system will also enable potential employers in assessing the performance of the candidates. In order to bring uniformity in the evaluation system and computation of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) based on student's performance in examinations, the UGC has formulated the guidelines to be followed.

Outline of Choice-Based Credit System

1. **Core Course :** A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.
2. **Elective Course:** Generally, a course that can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline / subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course : Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline / subject of study referred to as Discipline Specific Elective (to be offered by main discipline / subject of study).

Dissertation / Project Work: An elective course of 6 credits designed to acquire special / advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to project work, and candidate studies such a course on his own with advisory support by a teacher /

faculty member is called dissertation / project work. A Project / Dissertation work may be given in lieu of a discipline-specific elective paper.

Generic Elective Course (GEC) : An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline / subject, with an intention to seek exposure to other subjects / disciplines is called a Generic Elective Course.

P.S.: A core course offered in a discipline / subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline / subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to GE.

- 3. Ability Enhancement Courses:** The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds : Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). **AECC courses (two)** are mandatory for all disciplines. These courses are based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement (i) Environmental Science, (ii) English / MIL Communication.

Under Graduate Programme II and III year (Annual Pattern)

An Undergraduate program degree in Science may be awarded if a student completes 4 core courses in three disciplines of choice, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), 2 papers each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective papers based on the three disciplines of choice.

An Undergraduate program degree in Humanities / Social Sciences / Commerce may be awarded if a student completes 4 core papers each in two disciplines of choice, 2 core papers each in English and MIL (Hindi/Sanskrit) respectively, 2 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), minimum 4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), 2 papers each from a list of Discipline Specific Elective papers based on the two disciplines of choice, and two papers from the list of Generic Elective papers.

The Term '**Credit**' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours per week assigned to it. This explains why credit' is usually taken to mean 'credit hours'. For the purpose of credit determination, instruction is divided into three components:

LECTURES (L)- Classroom lectures of one hour duration.

TUTORIALS (T)- Special, elaborate instructions on specific topics (From Lecture) of one hour duration.

PRACTICALS (P) – Laboratory of field exercises in which the student has to do experiments or other practical work of two hour duration.

Each one of these components is considered as equal to one credit. One Lecture (L) as well as one Tutorial (T) of one hour a week is considered as one credit, whereas one Practical (P) of two hours a week is considered as one credit. The total weightage given to a course in terms of credits will be equal to L+T+P. This can be written in symbols as: $C = L + T + P$, Where, C is the credit weightage for a particular course.

Students Course wise Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and Evaluation

All courses (Core, Compulsory, Elective, and GE courses) involve an evaluation system of **students** that has the following two components: -

- (i) **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA): 30 Marks**
- (ii) **End-Term Examination (ETE) : 70Marks**

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA): This would have the following components:

- a) **Classroom Attendance** – Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures / Tutorials / Practical's. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the End-Term Examination (ETE).

Provided that exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed co-curricular activities (e.g. NCC, NSS, Youth Festivals, Sports etc.) to the extent of 25% (making the necessary attendance as 50% in these cases). However, the claim for this exemption should be supported by authenticated certificate from the concerned college authorities.

Classroom Attendance Incentive : Those having greater than 75% attendance (for those participating in Co-curricular activities, 25% will be added to percent attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows: -

75% But < 80% 1 marks

80% But < 85% 2 marks

85% But < 90% 3 marks

90% But < 95% 4 marks

95% > 5 marks

- b) **Mid Term Test (MTT):** The Mid Term Test will be taken after completing at-least 40% of the syllabus and will comprise of 15 marks.

- c) **Assignment work / class test / seminar:** Students will submit assignments in the courses they are pursuing. They will also go through class tests and prepare for seminars as per the direction of the concerned teachers. This component will carry 10 marks.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

a) Programmes Offered:

The College offers B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. programs affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University. The Admission under CBCS will be open for Main subjects (DSE / DSC) of English, Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics, Education, History, Music, Political Science, Philosophy, Public Administration, Sociology, Geography, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Computer Science, Physical Education and Commerce. The course structure for the candidates admitted in various faculties for session 2026-27 will be according to the CBCS structure of UGC. For details of course structure / syllabus the

students are advised to visit HP University / UGC website. (See, www.hpuniv.nic.in, www.ugc.ac.in)

b) Admissions schedule:

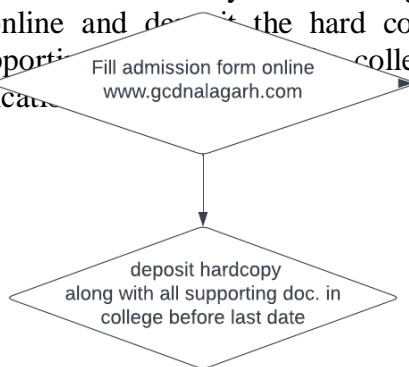
The dates for the submission of the duly filled admission form for 1st year students will be **01.06.2026 to 19.06.2026**. **Preadmission counseling** of these students will be carried out from **02.06.2026 to 19.06.2026**. The 1st Merit list for UG1st year students will be displayed on **20.06.2026 upto 5.00 pm** after scrutiny of these forms. Applicants are advised to check the college website (www.gcdnalagarh.com) regularly for updates and any changes in the schedule. **The fee is to be deposited through online mode from 21/06/2026 to 23/06/2026 (within 3 days)**. The 2nd Merit list will be displayed on **24.06.2026 upto 3.00 pm** and the fee for this merit to be deposited on **25.06.2026 to 27.06.2026**. The orientation of 1st year students will be held on **28.06.2026 to 30.06.2026** and regular teaching will be commencing w.e.f. from **01.07.2026 to 15th March 2027** excluding vacation period.

Admission of **UG 2nd and final year students** will be given on **Roll On basis** from **01.06.2026 to 19.06.2026**. These students may deposit their fees from **12.06.2026 to 23.06.2026**. **Post admission counseling, online submission of scholarship forms and student's feedback** will be carried out from **24.06.2026 to 30.06.2026**. Their regular teaching will be commencing w.e.f. from **01.07.2026 to 15th March 2027** excluding vacation period.

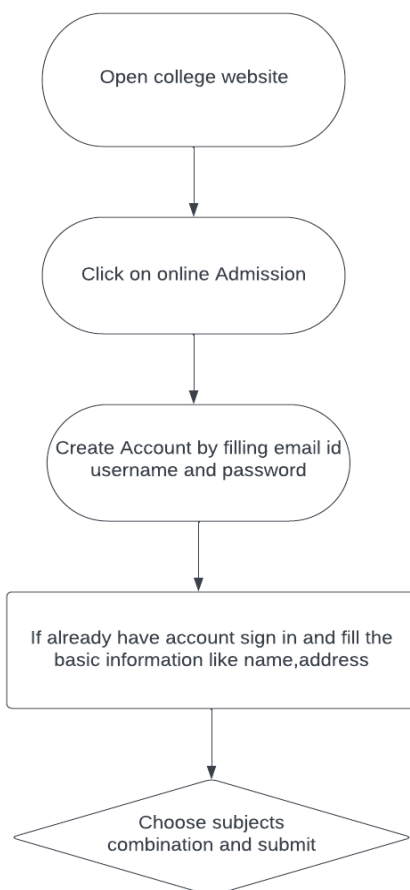
Total teaching days will be greater than 180. Annual practical examinations / remedial / need based classes / self study by students will be w.e.f. **16.03.2027 to 25.03.2027**.

c) Instructions for students seeking admission in BA / B.Sc. / B.Com - 1stYear:

1. A student seeking admission to the first year of the degree course will be required to fill the admission form online and deposit the hard copy of the same along with the photocopies of all supporting documents in the college office before the last day of submission of the application.



2. For all the relevant information regarding the college notification, faculty information, links are available on the college website.
3. Change of subject is allowed only with the permission of the Principal of the college. Change of faculty i.e. from Science to Arts and vice-versa is permissible only if the candidate has the required percentage of marks as specified for admission to that faculty
4. A candidate who has passed Prabhakar examination without passing 10+2 examination shall not be eligible for admission to any course in the college.
5. Candidates are required to upload original self-attested documents & passport size photo.
6. The college may discontinue a course of study if adequate number of students are not available in a particular course.
7. A student admitted to the college under CBCS will have to abide by all the rules and regulations of the college as stipulated in the college prospectus/students' charter.
8. Applicants for 2nd year and 2nd year will fill up their forms offline only for Roll on Admissions



• **Documents required (to be uploaded online and photocopies to be submitted along with the hard copy of the admission form)**

- i. **Passport size photographs:** Two unattested recent passport size photographs which will be attested by admission committees; one for the admission form and other for library / Identity card.
- ii. **Board / University Certificates alongwith Date of Birth Certificate :** Attested copies of certificates from matriculation onwards have to be attached alongwith application form. Originals must be presented for attestation. **(Certificates to be uploaded online).**
- iii. **Character Certificate and School Leaving Certificate :** in original from the Institution last attended and Migration certificate in original (if +2 passed from other boards). **(Certificates to be uploaded online).**
- iv. **Certificate of Equivalence from the HP Board :** This certificate has to be attached if candidate has passed +2 from other Boards. **(Also to be uploaded online).**
- v. **Migration Certificate :** It has to be procured from the concerned Board other than HP Board of School Education. **(To be uploaded online).**
- vi. **Copy of Bonafide Himachali certificate :** Girls belonging to HP must attach / upload Bonafide / Himachali certificate to avail exemption in fee.

Note:-

- 1) Fresh entrants will also fill University Registration form. For this additional one copy of Matriculation and 10+2 certificates is required.
- 2) Candidates who have passed the last examination in private capacity must upload **character certificate issued by Gazetted officer / Pradhan of their Panchayat /Municipal Councilor. The character certificate should not be more than 6 months old.**
- 3) Candidates with gap year will upload a **self attested affidavit stating facts / reasons for discontinuation of studies** during that gap year.
- 4) Students applying under any reserve category (SC / ST / OBC / IRDP etc.) seat must produce the relevant certificates **(to be uploaded).**

ADMISSION GUIDELINES

1. Admission to the under graduate courses will be governed by CBCS regulations of HP University.

2. **The Roster (120 points) and Reservation for undergraduate courses shall be as per HP Govt./HP University Norms.**
3. Age limit for admission to BA / B.Com / B. Sc 1st year is 23 year on 1st July, 2025 For girls it is 25 years as on 1st July, 2025. Age relaxation of three years is allowed in case of SC/ST candidates. Vice-Chancellor has the power to permit age relaxation for reasons to be recorded in writing up to a maximum of 6 months.
4. Parents / Guardian's signature is essential on the admission form failing which no admission will be entertained.
5. If the admission of any candidate is cancelled by the University, the college will not be responsible for it.
6. Students with a record of misconduct / indulged in ragging in previous years will not be given admission in the current session.

ELIGIBILITY

a) Eligibility criteria for admission to B.A (Pass Course):

- Candidate seeking admission to BA-1st Year must be clear cut pass at 10+2 level.
- The candidate who has passed all the five subjects including English from NOS is eligible to take admission in BA-1st Year.
- A student seeking admission in BA-1st Year with Mathematics as one of the subjects should have secured at least 45% marks in aggregate or 45% in Mathematics at 10+2 level.

b) Eligibility criteria for admission to B. Sc. (Pass Course):

- Must have qualified 10+2 examination or an examination equivalent there to of a Board/ University established by law in India with pass in four written subjects (three Science elective subjects & one English) with 45% marks.

OR

- Pre-University Science examination (two years) after 10 years schooling of an Indian University/ Board recognized by H.P. University in four written papers (one English plus three Science subjects with 45% marks).

c) Eligibility Criteria for admission to B.Com (Pass Course):

- Candidate seeking admission in B. Com-1st Year must have secured 45% Marks in 10+2 in aggregate with Mathematics / Economics as one of the compulsory subjects at 10+2 level or 45% Marks in aggregate for students from relevant vocational stream.

- The minimum percentage is 40% for those students who have passed 10+2 under the commerce group.
- In case of girl students, the minimum percentage is 33% at 10+2 level (clear cut pass).

Note:-

- A student placed under compartment in 10+2 will not be eligible to seek admission in any of the courses of Arts, Science and Commerce Streams.
- All admissions will be considered provisional unless regularized by the H.P. University and the college will assume no responsibility in case the H.P. University for reasons whatsoever does not approve the admission of the candidate.

Co-Curricular activities and Facilities available

National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The National Cadet Corps is statutory organization functioning under the Ministry of Defense, Government of India. Over the last six decades, the corps has evolved itself into the biggest uniform youth organization in the world crossing all boundaries of caste, creed, sex and society symbolizing state motto of **“Unity and Discipline”**. The corps aims in developing qualities of leadership, character building and good citizenship amongst the youth of our country.

For overall development of students and to inculcate qualities by virtue of which they can face life in a better way, one NCC unit for Boys and one for Girls is functioning under 1 HP NCC BN Solan in the College. Besides all NCC activities, the unit helps in spreading the message of anti - ragging in formal and informal meetings. All regular students can join NCC by filling out the enrolment form which can be obtained from the NCC offices. As NCC cadets, they can obtain 'BEE and CEE certificates. Apart from weightage given to NCC for admission in post-graduate courses, there are many other benefits in joining NCC.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

National Service Scheme is a lifeline of any educational institution. It inculcates the spirit of voluntary work among the students and teachers through sustained community interaction. It brings academic institutions closer to the society. In fact, the motto of NSS is **“Not Me but You”**. It stands for ideas:

- i) To forget and surrender the self and,
- ii) To render selfless service to the entire nation.

NSS teaches students to become socially aware and play a constructive role in society. Enrolment in NSS will be on selective basis. NSS volunteers get weightage for admission in PG courses.

Rovers and Rangers

The College is affiliated to the state association of Rovers and Rangers. Boys and girls are enrolled every year as Rovers and Rangers. The students are trained to serve community, society and humanity. **“Love, Unity and International Brotherhood”** is the main motto of Rovers and Rangers.

Sports

College life would be indeed lifeless without sports activities, hence the college calendar gives great importance to various activities in sports. We have the proud privilege of representing the university and state in many national and zonal level sports competitions. College participates in various sports activities held by the

University like Athletics, Badminton, Boxing, Cricket, Judo, Kabaddi, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Weightlifting and Wrestling etc. The College also has a fitness center. The Annual Athletic meet is organized by the Department of Sports every year with full colors. The students can join the game of their interest by appearing in trials conducted by the department of Physical Education.

College Magazine

The college publishes its Magazine “**Parbat Rekha**” annually which provides forum for the students with flair for writing. It gives vent to their thoughts and perceptions.

College Library

Library is an integral part of any educational institution. There are over 18,000 books in the college library, of diverse subjects. In addition to this, there is a regular subscription of various newspapers (Hindi and English) and magazines and journals for the benefit of students and teachers. Internet facility has also been provided to students in the library. This facility is free of cost and helps students to upgrade their knowledge. The college is connected with INFLIBNET (Information and Library Network Centre) having access to e-resource including e-journals and e-books. Library is having a Book Bank facility. Through this facility a student can get a book by paying cost of book +20% and can keep the book till end of the particular session. Entire amount will be refunded while returning the book. In case of loss/damage of book security money will be forfeited.

Career Guidance and Job Placement Cell

It helps students in providing the information for the selection of career and job placement through various government and private agencies, and to arrange the lectures by the experts and concerned officials for selection of better and stable career.

Scholarships / Fee Concession

Students are given various types of scholarships on the norms set by the Government and University for low income group students like SC, ST and IRDP. Fee concession for siblings is available. No tuition fee is charged from Bonafide Himachali girls provided they produce attested photocopy of Bonafide certificate.

College Students Central Association (CSCA)

College Students Central Association is formed every year in the beginning of the session aiming at the true aim of education i.e. holistic and integrated development of individuals, and converting them into national asset. The members of this body are chosen as per norms laid down by the H.P. University, on a date approved and notified by the HP University. The CSCA enables the participation of students in the decision making for running the college. The CSCA is composed of The Principal, five teachers nominated by Principal, four student office bearers, and class representatives.

Parents Teachers Association (PTA)

To encourage community participation in education a Parents– Teachers Association was established in 2004-05. PTA has emerged as a bridge to solve the issues and the problems of students and teachers in the field of education. The election for the Executive Committee of PTA is held in the month of July. In addition, parents are always welcome to visit the College and inquire about the progress of their wards. They are further advised to attend the meetings of PTA as and when it would be held for which an advance notice is displayed on the College Notice Board

Clubs and Societies

Different Clubs like Road Safety Club, Eco Club, Red Ribbon Club concerning environmental, health and social issues are functional in the College and different subject societies as well as Energy club, will also be constituted during the coming session. Students are advised to enroll themselves in at least one such Club/Society.

Youth Red Cross

Red Cross is an International voluntary organization engaged in various humanitarian activities. The state Branch of the Indian Red Cross has been devoting itself for the welfare of needy, sick and vulnerable people of the state. The society is implementing the Disaster Management Programme in the state. Youth Red Cross is part of Red Cross Society and represent the college unit. The member shall pledge themselves to carry out the fourfold programme of personal health, service to others, international friendliness of Red Cross Movement.

IQAC Cell

IQAC Cell has been setup in the college to monitor internal quality of the college important decisions relating to the betterment of the college as well as for all round development of the students are taken by IQAC.

Indira Gandhi National Open University

The IGNOU Study Center is functioning the institution since 2009. The center caters to the higher educational needs of those students who cannot pursue their study in the college as regular students. IGNOU is offering more than 340 Programmes with the help of its various Study Centres. In this center, at present, IGNOU is offering the following courses

1. Bachelor Preparatory Programme (BPP)
2. Bachelor of Arts (BA) / Commerce/Tourism
3. Master of Arts – Hindi / English / Pol. Science / History / Public Administration
4. One Year Post Graduate Diplomas in Various Streams
5. Six Month Certificate Courses in Various Streams

Students can pursue its programmes while doing their regular degree from any other University. The detail information regarding Admission/ Examination can be obtained from the Coordinator of IGNOU Center.

Community College

Government College Nalagarh has the privilege of being chosen to host a Community College being run by Ministry of Human Resource Development. Community College serves multiple needs like career oriented education and providing employable and certifiable skills with necessary general education to Senior Secondary School pass outs not willing to join existing higher education system. At present, Community College Nalagarh is offering an Advanced Diploma Course in Hospitality and Tourism. Students are advised to propagate the message of Community College in their neighborhood so that the benefit of this scheme reaches the large section of society.

BBA, BCA and PGDCA

College is also offering BBA, BCA and PGDCA courses on self-financing basis. These courses have been started, keeping in view the demand for trained students in computer applications in private as well as public/govt. sectors. Admission to these courses is also on merit basis.

Hostels

The College has hostels for boys as well as girls. The capacity of Boys hostels is 99 beds and that of Girls hostel is 108 beds. The students who apply for hostel accommodation must adhere to the following rules and instructions:-

1. A student can apply for hostel accommodation, after he/she is admitted in college.
2. Admission forms for hostel accommodation are available in the college office.
3. Students will be admitted to the hostel on first come first serve basis.
4. The recommendation of Warden is necessary for admission to the hostel.
5. The room will be allotted on a due date by the authorities.
6. The general discipline requirement of the college shall be applicable to boarders as well.
7. Any other rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary by the Principal according to the circumstances are to be observed by the resident scholars/boarders.
8. Hostel students will not indulge in any act that may come under the definition of ragging.
9. The residents of the hostel are not permitted to change the room allotted to them without prior permission of the Warden.
10. Fresh admission to the hostel will have to be sought in every academic year.
11. Every boarder shall have to abide by time-schedule as laid down from time to time.
12. No guest can stay in the hostel without prior permission of the Warden.

Old Students Association

The purpose of this association is to bring together old students on a common platform. It has a formal structure with elected office bearers and its annual meeting is held in the College. As large number of its members are from adjoining areas and they volunteer their contributions to ensure quality education in the Institution.







Equal Opportunity cell

This cell is functional in the College to oversee the effective implementation of policies and programs for disadvantaged groups. It aims to provide guidance and counseling with respect to academic, financial, social and other matters.

STUDENT CHARTER

The students are important stakeholders in any educational institution. The Students' Charter as adopted by IQAC of the college is a document that defines and confers rights, responsibilities and privileges of the students with a view to achieve holistic growth.

A) Responsibilities of the institution towards the students: Govt. Degree College, Nalagarh is committed to fulfil the following needs of its pupils:

-  Healthy atmosphere for their academic, individual and collective growth and development.
-  Creating awareness about the value and purpose of education as upheld in the vision, goals, programmes of study, instructional methodology and various co-curricular as outlined in the Annual Calendar of Activities.
-  To provide free access to the students to every kind of information about college/university statutes ordinances, acts, regulations, policies, procedure and curriculum.
-  To inculcate amongst the students the values of social responsibility, religious and cultural tolerance and other values of human and national importance as per the Constitution of India and the vision document of the University Grants commission.
-  To adopt a student centric approach in teaching – learning methodology.
-  To develop the competence of the students at different levels, especially with regard to:
 - a) Linguistic competence, b) Logical and Analytical ability, c) scientific temperament and d) entrepreneurship.

- ✚ To provide support and guidance to the students through continuous mentoring viz. regular tutorials, remedial course and career counseling.
- ✚ To provide the students adequate exposure to the teaching –learning methodology through conventional and smart Classrooms.
- ✚ To receive constant feedback from the students and other stakeholders like the Parents'-Teachers' Association, the Old Students' Association for improving and strengthening the activities of the institution and to act upon the same in an empathic and pragmatic manner.

B) Responsibilities of the students towards the Institution:

All students of the college are expected to observe the following guidelines in the larger interest of the institution:

- ✚ To understand, appreciate and follow the vision and goals of the institution.
- ✚ To have clear and adequate knowledge of various programmes of study, admission policy, programme completion requirements, assessment mechanism and other students services of the college.
- ✚ To undertake regular and intense study of their course material.
- ✚ To adhere to the general norms of the institution with regard to the course of study time schedule as per ordinance/rules/acts of HP Government or HP University /UGC as framed and implemented from time to time.
- ✚ To abide by the decision of the college administration in case any grievance, individual or pertaining to more than one student/group and to help the college administration.
- ✚ To make optimum use of learning resources available in the college and to participate actively in academically enriching programmes such as seminars, workshops debates etc.
- ✚ To provide neutral feedback on the quality of teaching and various other activities undertaken by the college, both in a formal as well as informal way, whenever they are asked for the same.
- ✚ To contribute to the enrichment of institutional life of the college through their engagement in all the student related activities of the institution as outlined in Part A of Students' Charter.

- ✚ Not to indulge in acts of Ragging or to make use of any kind of intoxicants in and around the institution.
- ✚ Not to shout slogans, damage college property, deface walls or desks, spit or spread litter in the campus, or indulge in other acts of violence which tend to disrupt academic and general atmosphere of the college and amount to unlawful or criminal acts.
- ✚ To follow the moral and constitutional values as enshrined in our multi-dimensional culture, the Constitution of India including respect for diversity of ideas/thinking. Inculcation of inclusive culture without any preconceived notions of caste, creed or religion.

Important University / College Rules for Strict Compliance

- a) Students are directed to switch off their mobile phones as and when they enter class rooms. Playing music and songs on mobile phones that is likely to create disturbance is strictly prohibited. Student found indulging in such practices shall be penalized.
- b) Use of Tobacco products is banned under COPTA2003 (Cigarette & other Tobacco Products Act, 2003). If someone is found using these products, he/she will be penalized under the Act.
- c) Ragging in any form inside the campus or on approach road (s) leading to College campus is a crime and will lead to heavy fines and even expulsion or other actions as recommended by Govt. of India. Each and every student will have to give undertaking (given in prospectus) not to indulge in ragging of any kind.
- d) Crowding / standing in corridors causes disturbance in classes, hence students are advised to not to do the same.
- e) Only those functions can be held in College campus (premises and ground) which are organized or allowed by the college authorities. Such function must be completed in definite time frame for which permission is granted.
- f) Pasting of unauthorized posters in the College, writing on the walls, blackboards, notice boards is strictly prohibited.
- g) A student bringing outsiders in the College campus will be severely punished. Outsiders are not allowed to roam about in the College campus.

- h) Use of alcohol and drugs is strictly prohibited. Any student found indulging in it will be penalized.
- i) 75% attendance in each course, theory & practical separately is compulsory for being eligible to appear in End Term Examination of University.
- j) The name of the student who remains absent from the College for more than ten days without prior sanction of the Principal, will be struck off from the College Rolls.
- k) A student whose name is struck off twice from the College Rolls will not be readmitted.
- l) The absentee fine for one period is Rs. 1.00/- & for one practical is Rs. 3.00/- (xiii) Students are required to get prior leave sanction in case they have to be absent from the College. The leave application must be countersigned by parents or guardians. In case of long sick leave a medical certificate is to be attached.
- m) It is mandatory to carry your identity card with you in the College. It will have to be produced whenever asked for.
- n) In case of loss of Identity Card, student will have to file an FIR in the Police Station and apply for issuance of duplicate Identity Card along with the copy of the FIR for which Rs. 20/- will be charged.
- o) No student will be allowed to join two full time regular Degree Courses of study simultaneously.
